The attached Resolution 50-2025, A Resolution of the Omak City Council Approving, a land use agreement with the USDA FOREST SERVICE for use of portions of Eastside Park for emergency fire camp use is forwarded for your consideration.

The purpose of this agreement is to facilitate the rental of land for use as an incident command post/base camp for emergency incidents.

Period of Performance: 07/14/2025 to 12/31/2029

The agreement is setup similar to the DNR agreement that is in place, giving options on location depending on other scheduled park uses.

# A RESOLUTION OF THE OMAK CITY COUNCIL APPROVING A LAND USE AGREEMENT WITH THE USDA FOREST SERVICE FOR USE OF PORTIONS OF EAST SIDE PARK FOR EMERGENCY FIRE CAMP USE

WHEREAS, the USDA FOREST SERVICE has provided an agreement to establish an arrangement for the use of specific portions of Eastside Park for purposes of setting up a full Base Camp related to wildland fires; and

**WHEREAS**, the Agreement identifies the areas requested in the park, that can be used to set up an Incident Command Base Camp for firefighters; and

**WHEREAS**, the Exhibit "A" shows separate areas to help alleviate conflicts with other park uses.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the City Council of the City of Omak, Washington, hereby approves and ratifies contract no. 1202RZ25T0145, between the City of Omak, and the USDA Forest Service, a copy which is attached hereto, as Exhibit "A", for use of portions of Omak East Side Park as an Incident Command Base Camp

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### **DESCRIPTION/ SPECIFICATIONS/ STATEMENT OF WORK**

This Blanket Purchase Agreement (BPA) may be utilized by multiple State and Federal wildland fire agencies for Local, Regional, Nationwide fire suppression, all-hazard incident, and prescribed fire project work in support of the Wildfire Crisis Strategy.

The owner of the property described herein, or the duly appointed representative of the owner, agrees to furnish the land/facilities for use as incident command post/base camp including but not limited to sleeping areas, equipment staging, mobile kitchens, mobile showers, office trailers/tents, parking, and other incident resources.

### **PROJECT LOCATION & DESCRIPTION**

Eastside Park, 411 Omak Ave, Omak, WA 98841. Approximately 76 total acres.

Location: Between the Okanogan River and the intersection of Omak Avenue and State Route 20/US-97

The areas included in this agreement are outlined on the attached map. Use of these and any additional areas within the park is subject to the discretion of Public Works personnel, based on existing scheduled activities.

Area 1 (red outline): 19 acres
Area 2 (green outline): 10 acres
Area 3 (yellow outline): 7.5 acres

Areas excluded from the agreement and generally off limits to incident use: Omak Stampede office, bathrooms, swimming pool, tennis courts, Eastside Park Loop and RV Park.

Area outlined in blue on the attached map is the Omak Stampede grounds. It is not included in this agreement and any potential use of that area would require an agreement with Omak Stampede.

### **RATE**

For each day that the land/facilities are used, the Government will pay the rate as <u>indicated below.</u> Ordinary wear and tear is included in the rate. The maximum amount to be paid under this agreement shall not exceed \$250,000.00

Rate breakout:

Area 1 (red outline): \$500.00 per day
Area 2 (green outline): \$500.00 per day
Area 3 (yellow outline): \$500.00 per day

Other areas as approved by city personnel: \$15.00 per acre per day.

Start Date: 07/16/2025 End Date: 12/31/2029

### **DEFINITIONS**

<u>Ordinary Wear and Tear:</u> Ordinary wear and tear is based on the customary use of the land/facilities, and not the use resulting from the incident. Reasonable costs incurred by the owner (beyond ordinary wear and tear) in restoring land/facilities to their prior condition shall be submitted, in writing, to the Contracting Officer.

**Emergency:** Is any all-risk incident that required fast mobilization of resource for suppression or support efforts.

<u>Severity or Staging:</u> Occurs when predicted or actual burning conditions exceed those normally expected due to severe weather conditions. These conditions may result in prepositioning of resources in the event of an all-risk incident including wildfire.

### **CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION DATA**

### **PAYMENT**

PAID BY INCIDENT AT TIME OF USE: The host agency for each incident is responsible for payments. See Exhibit B for complete agency payment office information.

### **INVOICE**

PAID BY INCIDENT AT TIME OF USE: The Finance Unit or designated representative will receive vendor's commercial invoices or shift tickets, and documents providing itemized breakdown of charges. They will validate with incident approved vendor generated invoices, review, sign, and submit to the payment center.

The Incident Finance or Local Unit will submit a payment package including all signed originals, including:

- A detailed invoice that supports each order
- Copy of resource order(s) to match/support Vendors Invoice
- A copy of Vendors Agreement SF-1449 Including any Modifications
- Any other supporting documentation

Per the National Wildfire Coordinating Group (NWCG) Standards for Interagency Incident Business Management and transmittal sheet to the designated payment office.

### **SPECIAL CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS**

### INSURANCE/ INDEMINIFCATION

The United States Federal Government is self-insured and does not have the authority to indemnify and hold harmless the <u>City of Omak</u> from any and all claims, liabilities, losses, damages, charges, etc. The <u>City of Omak</u> does not have the authority to indemnify and hold harmless the United States Federal Government from any and all claims, liabilities, losses, damages, charges etc. The <u>City of Omak</u> will be responsible for errors, omissions and negligence of its employees. The United States Federal Government will be responsible for errors, omissions and

negligence of its employees to the extent provided by Congress under the Federal Tort Claims Act [28 U.S.C. 1346(b), 2401(b), 2671-2680, as amended by P.L. 89-506, 80-Stat. 306].

### **INSPECTIONS**

Annually and at time of use a Pre and Post-Use inspections should be completed jointly by both a Government official and an owner/representative. If at any time it is suspected that the Government use has caused damage, this shall be immediately documented using a Daily Diary Form (FS-6300-20). Please refer to both Exhibit C and D.

### LOSS, DAMAGE OR DESTRUCTION

The Government will assume liability for the loss, damage, or destruction of facilities furnished under this Agreement, provided that no reimbursement will be made for loss, damage, or destruction when due to (1) ordinary wear and tear, or (2) the fault or negligence of the owner or the owner's agent(s).

#### CANCELLATION

This agreement can be terminated at any time by either party upon 30 days written noticed to the other party.

### DESIGNATION OF PROGRAM POINT OF CONTACT (POC)/CONTRACTING OFFICER REPRESENTATIVE (COR)

The Contracting Officer designates the Contracting Officer's Representative (COR). The COR is responsible for administering the performance of work under this contract. In no event, however, will any understanding, agreement, modification, change order, or other matter deviating from the terms of this contract be effective or binding upon the Government unless formalized by proper contractual documents executed by the Contracting Officer prior to completion of the contract.

The Contracting Officer must be informed as soon as possible of any actions or inactions by the Contractor using the FS-6300-20/21 Daily Dairy, ICS 213 General Message or comparable.

The Attached <u>Ordinance 1954</u> - <u>Amending the City of Omak 2025 Budget, Appropriating Additional Funds in the Current Expense Fund for Airport Interfund Loan, is forwarded for your consideration.</u>

The Ordinance recognizes a \$200,000.00 Interfund loan from the Current Expense Fund to the Airport fund. This is a zero-interest loan that will be paid back before the end of the fiscal year.

This transfer is needed to maintain cash flow, for the project work, that is being completed on the north taxiway and runway projects. FAA is holding a portion of the eligible reimbursement funds for these projects until close outs are complete. Estimated reimbursements will be more than adequate for payment of the loan funds.

I approve of this Ordinance and recommend its adoption.

# AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE 2025 BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF OMAK, APPROPRIATING ADDITIONAL FUNDS IN THE CURRENT EXPENSE FUND FOR AIRPORT INTERFUND LOAN

- **WHEREAS**, the City of Omak adopted the 2025 Budget by passage of Ordinance No. 1947 on December 2, 2024; and
- **WHEREAS**, the \$1.2 million-dollar North Taxiway Reconstruction Project is funded mostly with grant dollars from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), Airport Improvement Program; and
- **WHEREAS**, the FAA withholds a percentage of eligible reimbursements for this grant until the project is closed out; and
- **WHEAREAS**, additional cash flow is needed in the Airport Fund to meet its continued operation and obligations until the close out of the North Taxiway Reconstruction Project; and
- **WHEREAS,** a \$200,000 Interfund Loan from the Current Expense Fund to the Airport Fund will provide the needed cash flow for the continued operation and obligations of the Airport Fund; and
- **WHEREAS**, the loan to the Airport Fund shall bear an interest rate of 0% per annum; and
  - WHEREAS, repayment of the loan shall be made by December 31, 2025; and
- **WHEREAS**, said expenditures are not one of the emergencies specifically enumerated in RCW 35A.33.080; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City of Omak is desirous of amending its budget pursuant to RCW 35A.33.090.

### THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OMAK DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. Ordinance No. 1947, adopting the 2025 Budget, shall be amended to include changes to the budget as shown in Attachment "A" of this ordinance.
- Section 2. This ordinance shall become effective from and after the date of its passage by Council by a vote of one more than the majority of all Councilmembers, approval by the Mayor and publication as required by law.

SUBJECT: Ordinance 1955 - Amendment to Chapter 12.04 Speed Limits with Milepost

References

### **Purpose**

This memo accompanies a proposed ordinance amending Chapter 12.04 of the Omak Municipal Code to include milepost references for designated speed limits. The amendment aims to improve clarity, enforcement, and consistency with state transportation standards.

### **Background**

Chapter 12.04 currently outlines speed limits for various streets within the City of Omak. However, many of these limits lack precise geographic markers, which can lead to confusion for drivers, enforcement personnel, and transportation planners.

To address this, the Public Works Department has reviewed all listed streets and incorporated Washington State Route (SR) milepost references where applicable. These updates align with the Washington Model Traffic Ordinance and enhance the accuracy of local traffic regulations.

### **Key Updates**

- Milepost references added to major corridors including Omak Avenue, Dayton Street, Riverside Drive, Okoma Drive, Koala Drive, and Central Avenue East.
- School zones remain unchanged but are now more clearly defined by adjacent mileposts and intersections.
- A summary sheet has been prepared listing each street, its speed limit, and the corresponding milepost or location reference.

### Recommendation

Staff recommends adoption of the proposed ordinance to improve clarity and enforceability of speed limits throughout the City of Omak.

# ORDINANCE NO. 1955

# AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF OMAK, WASHINGTON, AMENDING CHAPTER 12.04 OF THE OMAK MUNICIPAL CODE TO INCLUDE MILEPOST LOCATIONS FOR DESIGNATED SPEED LIMITS

**WHEREAS**, the City of Omak has adopted the Washington Model Traffic Ordinance (MTO) with local modifications; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council finds it in the public interest to clarify speed limit boundaries by including milepost references for designated streets.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, the City Council of the City of Omak, Washington, does ordain as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. Amend Title 12, Chapter 12.04 of the Omak Municipal Cod- State Law Adopted-Speed Limits, is hereby amended to read as follows:

### 12.04.010 Model Traffic Ordinance adopted by reference-Speed limits on certain streets excepted.

- (a) The Washington Model Traffic Ordinance, being Chapter 308-330 of the Washington Administrative Code, referred to as the "MTO," is hereby adopted by reference as if fully set forth, except for the speed limits set forth in subsection (b) of this section, and except that the following sections of the MTO are not adopted by reference and are expressly deleted: WAC 308-330-142, 308-330-145, 308-330-145, 308-330-215, 308-330-225, 308-330-230, 308-330-235, 308-330-240, 308-330-240, 308-330-245, 308-330-255, 308-330-265, 308-330-275, 308-330-436, 308-330-600, 308-330-610, 308-330-620, 308-330-630, 308-330-640, 308-330-650, 308-330-660.
- (b) The speed limits on the following streets shall be as follows:
  - (1) Omak Avenue extending east from the east side of Dayton Street (SR 155 Milepost 80.15) to the city limits, thirty-five miles per hour, with a school zone thereby established in front of the East Omak School at twenty miles per hour on Omak Avenue when children are present, and a school zone is hereby established on Oak Street commencing at the north Omak city limits, continuing south to and including the intersection of Oak Street and Riverside Drive at twenty miles per hour when children are present;
  - (2) On Riverside Drive, commencing at its intersection with Main Street continuing easterly to the Cornerstone Christian Fellowship Church parking lot (SR 215 Milepost 5.55), twenty-five miles per hour;


- (3) On Riverside Drive, commencing at the Cornerstone Christian Fellowship Church parking lot (SR 215 Milepost 5.55) continuing easterly to its intersection with Highway 97 (SR 215 Milepost 6.24), thirty-five miles per hour;
- (4) On Okoma Drive from the south corporate limits of Omak north (SR 215 Milepost 3.68) to State Milepost 4.49, between Fourth Avenue and Fifth Avenue, thirty miles per hour;
- (5) On Dayton Street from Highway 97 (SR 155 Milepost 80.47) to Omak Avenue (SR 155 Milepost 80.15), thirty-five miles an hour;
- (6) On Main Street south to Fourth Avenue and thence on Fourth Avenue west to Okoma Drive, and thence on Okoma Drive to State Milepost 4.49, between Fourth Avenue and Fifth Avenue, twenty-five miles per hour;
- (7) The speed limit on Juniper Place from its commencement at Bartlett Avenue running south and west to Juniper Street is reduced to ten miles per hour;
- (8) The speed limit in the school zone established around the Omak High School and Middle School campus on the following streets is hereby established as twenty miles per hour, when children are present: on Second Avenue between Cedar Street and Fir Street; on Central Avenue between Elm Street and Cedar Street; on First Avenue between Fir Street and Elm Street; on Cedar Street between Central Avenue and Second Avenue; and on Fir Street between First Avenue and Second Avenue;
- (9) On Ridge Drive twenty-five miles per hour, with a school zone thereby established in front of the Bethel Christian Academy at twenty miles per hour, when children are present;
- (10) On Copple Road from its intersection with Koala running westerly to the city limits, thirty-five miles per hour;
- (11) On Koala Drive, commencing at its intersection with Quince Street continuing easterly, then northeasterly to the north city limits, thirty-five miles per hour;
- (12) On Shumway Road, commencing at its intersection with Koala Drive continuing westerly to the city limits, thirty-five miles per hour;
- (13) On Engh Road from its intersection with River Road to the Omak city limits, thirty-five miles per hour.
- (14) On Central Ave E from Main St (SR 155 Spur Milepost 80.15) to the intersection with Daton St (SR 155 Milepost 80.15), twenty-five miles per hour.
- (c) Appropriate signs will be placed along the street to designate the speed limits; one copy of the foregoing model traffic ordinance and state statutes adopted by reference therein shall be on file in the office of the city clerk. # ORDINANCE NO. <u>1956</u>

# AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2.20 OF THE OMAK MUNICIPAL **CODE PARK BOARD**

WHEREAS, the current Omak Municipal Code outlines the formation and operations of the Park Board; and

WHEREAS, minor updates and clarification of the code are needed for the efficient operation and convenience of the Board.

### THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OMAK, WASHINGTON, DO ORDAIN as follows:

**Section 1.** Chapter 9.04.360 of the Omak Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as shown in Exhibit "A" attached hereto. New language is indicated by underscore, and deleted language is indicated by strikethrough.

**Section 2.** This ordinance shall become effective after its passage by the Council, with approval by the Mayor, and five days after publication of this ordinance, or a summary, as provided by law.

### **EXHIBIT** "A"

### 2.20.010 Park—Board—Defined.

Words used shall have the following meaning: "Park" means an area of land, with or without water, developed and used for public recreational purposes, including landscaped tracts, picnic grounds, playgrounds, athletic fields, recreation centers, camps, foot, bicycle and bridle paths, motor vehicle drives, wildlife sanctuaries, museums, zoological and botanical gardens, facilities for bathing, boating, hunting, and fishing, as well as other recreational facilities for the use and benefit of the public. "Board" means board of park commissioners. (Ord. 380 § 1, August 18, 1958).

# 2.20.020 Created—Commissioners' appointment.

There is hereby created a board of park commissioners, consisting of five members, who shall be appointed by the mayor, with the consent of the city-City councilCouncil, from citizens of recognized fitness for such position who reside in this city. No commissioner shall receive any compensation for his/her services. (Ord. 1269 § 1, 1994: Ord. 380 § 2, August 18, 1958).

### 2.20.030 Term—Removal—Vacancies.

The two additional commissioners appointed shall determine by lot whose term shall expire in two years and whose term shall expire in three years respectively and their terms shall begin after their appointment has been approved by the city City council Council and upon taking the usual oath of office. The term of office shall terminate on the first Monday in June, and at the expiration of each commissioner's term, the mayor shall appoint, with the consent of the city City council Council, one member for a three-year term. Members of the board may be removed at any time by the mayor, and vacancies for the remainder of unexpired terms shall be filled in the same manner in which original appointments are made. (Ord. 1269 § 2, 1994: Ord. 380 § 3, August 18, 1958).

# 2.20.040 Officers—Meetings—Quorum.

- (a) Immediately after their appointment, members of the board shall meet and organize by electing from the members of the board a president or "Chair", a secretary, and such other officers as may be necessary. The Board may designate one of its members to act as secretary without salary, or if requested by the Board, the mayor shall designate a member of the paid staff of the city to serve as such secretary. It shall be the duty of the president or chair to preside at all meetings of the board and of the secretary to keep minutes of all meetings and of all proceedings of the board. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and three affirmative votes shall be necessary to carry any proposition.
- (b) Regular meetings of the Omak park board shall be held on the second Tuesday of each month at the hour of seven five p.m. in the council chambers Omak City Hall, Omak, Washington. (Ord. 1379 § 1, 1998; Ord. 1269 § 3, 1994: Ord. 1237 § 1, 1993: Ord. 380 § 4, 1958).

### 2.20.050 Powers and duties.

The board shall advise the mayorMayor, the city-City councilCouncil, and department, if any, or officials administering parks, regarding the general supervision and control of all parks and recreational facilities and programs of the cityCity. The board shall have the power to advise regarding the establishment of a park and/or recreation department, hereinafter called "the department," and regarding the employment of necessary personnel, and to advise regarding conduct of any form of recreation or cultural activity that will employ the leisure time of the people in a constructive and wholesome manner, and shall advise regarding control and supervision of all parks belonging to said ethe City, and advise regarding planning, promotion, management and acquisition, construction, development, maintenance, and operation, including restrictions on, and compensation to be paid for, concessions or privileges in parks and/or playgrounds, either within or without the city limits, of parks, squares, parkways and boulevards, play and recreation grounds, and/or other municipally owned recreational facilities, including community buildings, and improvement and ornamentation of the same; make recommendations regarding entering into written contracts with the United States, the state of Washington, any county, city or town, park district, school district, or any such public organizations for the purpose of conducting a recreational program or exercising any other power granted by this chapter.

The board shall submit to the city council Public Works Director each year, on or before the second Monday in August, an estimate of the amount of money required by the department to carry on its activities for the ensuing year, together with recommendations for the development of the program and facilities as it may deem advisable, for the information and guidance of the city council in preparing the budget for the tax levy, for the operation and maintenance of the city parks and the recreational program and necessary facilities and the acquisition of land, structures, or facilities needed therefor. The board shall have power to recommend rules and regulations for the government, management, supervision, and control of city parks and recreational facilities and programs. Such rules and regulations must be approved by the council before they become effective. (Ord. 380 § 5, 1958).

## 2.20.060 Advisory committee—Appointment—Duties.

The city council may at its discretion also appoint an advisory committee, consisting of not more than fourteen members, which committee shall, if so appointed, meet with the park board and shall have authority to participate in the transactions of the park board to the extent of making recommendations to the board relative to the parks of the city purpose for which said advisory committee was formed. (Ord. 1316 § 1, 1996: Ord. 380 § 6, 1958).
